About the Author:



Brit Bennett is the author of two New York Times bestselling novels, The Mothers (2016) and The Vanishing Half (2020), one of the most-read books of 2020-21. Her essays have appeared in The New Yorker, The New York Times, The New Republic, The Oxford American, The Paris Review, Vogue, and Jezebel. Her 2014 essay, "I Don't Know What To Do with Good White People," brought her widespread attention. Her essays have been likened to those of Ta-Nehisi Coates, and her fiction has been linked to that of Toni Morrison.

A native of Southern California, Bennett graduated from Stanford University with a BA in English and received an MFA from the University of Michigan where she received a Hopwood Award for Graduate Short Fiction and the 2014 Hurston/Wright Award for College Writers. She also studied at Oxford University.

Publishers Weekly calls *The Mothers* a "brilliant, tumultuous debut novel." *The Mothers* was longlisted for the NBCC John Leonard First Novel Prize and the PEN/Robert W. Bingham Prize for Debut Fiction. Bennett was named a 5 Under 35 honoree by the National Book Foundation.

Kirkus says that *The Vanishing Half* is "a tour de force," "assured and magnetic. . . expertly paced," and adds, "Bennett is deeply engaged in the unknowability of other people and the scourge of colorism.... Bennett keeps all these plot threads thrumming and her social commentary crisp... in this rich, sharp story about the way identity is formed." Alana is a teaching artist for InsideOut Literary Arts and the basic needs organizer with Mothering Justice, a grassroots policy advocacy organization that provides mothers of color. Alana facilitated The Tuxedo Project's virtual book discussion of *The Mothers* for adults.

• Ashley Calhoun is the co-founder of Literary Detroit, a book culture web portal and artist collective. Over the past decade, she has worked with social, political, and artistic organizations throughout Metro Detroit to strengthen their communities through philanthropy and sustainable change.
